our middle schools and high schools.

Kaiser Permanente, La Familia, Roots Community Clinic also partnered with the District to provide vaccination clinics during the pandemic, and Roots Community

Clinic is now leasing space at the Parker campus to provide extensive health services to the East Oakland community.

Oakland's schools were recognized as having one of the strongest responses to the COVID pandemic in the state, if not the nation, providing thousands of COVID tests, high-quality masks, extensive contact tracing, meals for families struggling with poverty, and digital access for students via #OaklandUndivided during distance learning and afterwards.

Discussion

This year, Oakland, like many cities is confronting a serious challenge in the form of the 'triple-demic' of RSV, COVID, and influenza, causing many students to miss school at a time when the District is re-emphasizing the importance of constant attendance in the wake of severe rates of chronic absence during the pandemic years.

Oakland's students are additionally missing many required childhood vaccines such as MMR, DTAP, hepatitis, pneumococcus, meningococcus, varicella, and others, due to missed routine medical visits during the pandemic, as well as the much higher rate of newcomer immigrant/refugee students in Oakland compared to other cities, which makes our schools more vulnerable to the possibility of outbreaks of these diseases.

In previous years, the County's 'Shoo the Flu' program brought flu vaccine clinics to the majority of Oakland elementary school campuses, but this year, the program is only funded to be at approximately one dozen school campuses in the highest priority zip codes.

There is much reason to be grateful to the Alameda County Public Health Department, Health Equity Policy and Planning unit for their long history of partnering with the district to support better health outcomes for all of our students

The community partner organizations that are working so hard day in and day out to provide health services, including vaccinations, to all of our students are also worthy of tremendous appreciation.

However, it is also incumbent on us to urge the Alameda County Board of Supervisors to increase funding for the 'Shoo the Flu' program to provide flu and COVID vaccine clinics at every public elementary school in Oakland, as well as childhood vaccine support in key zip codes.

Finally, we must urge all families to ensure that all their children, from infants to teenagers, are up to date on all their vaccines and are getting their annual flu and COVID shots, to prevent disease and ensure regular attendance which is crucial to academic success, knowing that every second at school counts.
