Dr. Travis Bristol asked our educators why they are pursuing Board Certification. The response: "We are here to improve our practice."

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OUSD Hosts Major Robotics Competition for First Time



For the first time, OUSD hosted the Oakland Qualifying Tournament Robotics Competition on Sunday, February 4. The event, which usually happens in the South Bay showed the incredible STEM program offerings in Oakland schools.

Hundreds of students from eight OUSD schools and other schools from around the Bay Area converged on the McClymonds High campus with their latest creations to compete against each other. This competition was also meaningful for OUSD as it stood as a testament to our commitment to challenging systemic inequities and biases in STEM education.

OUSD District-Wide Community School Systems

Attendance Teams: Increase School Attendance by analyzing data, develop innovative systems, and focus on building relationships to address chronic abs

Coordination of Service Team (COST): Multidisciplinary team assesses school and community needs and traiges student referrals, analyzes data and community intervention to increase success at school.



Community Partnerships: Approved Partnerships Process to increase safety, collaboration and quality to identify high quality partners to fill gaps, address need and integrate/align with school goals.

Culture of Safety & Belonging: Schools develop and implement strategies to create school communities where students are physically and emotionally safe.

Expanded Learning: Supports partnerships between school sites and community based organizations (CBOs) for before and after school and summer.

Family Engagement: Provides (1) parent leadership development and support for parents and site family liaisons; (2) site based training on academic parent-teacher partnerships; (3) parent volunteer infrastructure; and (4) professional learning for school governance teams on engaging families with site planning and continuous improvement.

Health Education, Health Services & School Based Health Centers: Free medical, mental health, health education, and youth development services for students across the District.

Restorative Justice: A framework for teachers, students and school staff that encourages an equitable, community-centered and restorative (vs. punitive) school environment.




