5. Safe and Positive School Culture

Programmatic Narrative Based on Data Analysis

Community School for Creative Education (CSCE), a TK–8 public Waldorf charter school serving the culturally rich and historically underserved San Antonio neighborhood of Oakland, will partner with EverForward, a nationally respected youth development organization specializing in mentoring, emotional literacy, and identity-affirming practices. Through this collaboration, CSCE will offer a coherent, relationship-centered program that combines social-emotional learning (SEL), restorative student circles, and creative, arts-integrated activities. This program is designed to build trust, empathy, and emotional resilience among middle-school students while strengthening the broader school climate and supporting long-term student well-being.
