- What can students and staff do to prevent, intervene, and better resolve student conflict?

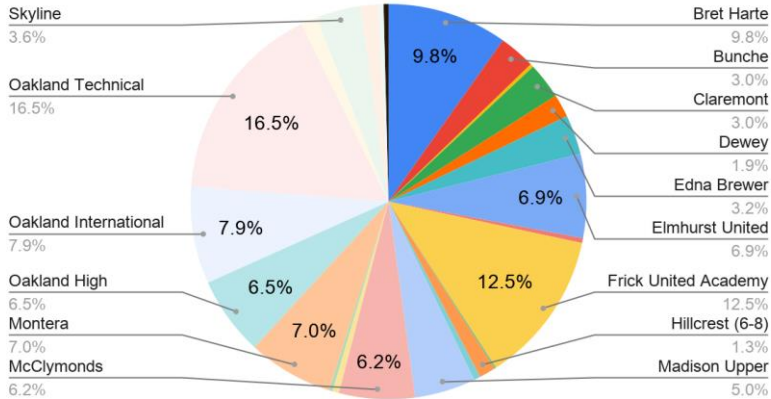
Why Explore Student Conflict?

- **HUGE impact** of repeated safety incidents over time
- Schools shape the long-term experience of young people
- Safety impacts academic outcomes, student attendance and enrollment decisions
- Staff interactions directly impact students' emotional safety

Participating Schools



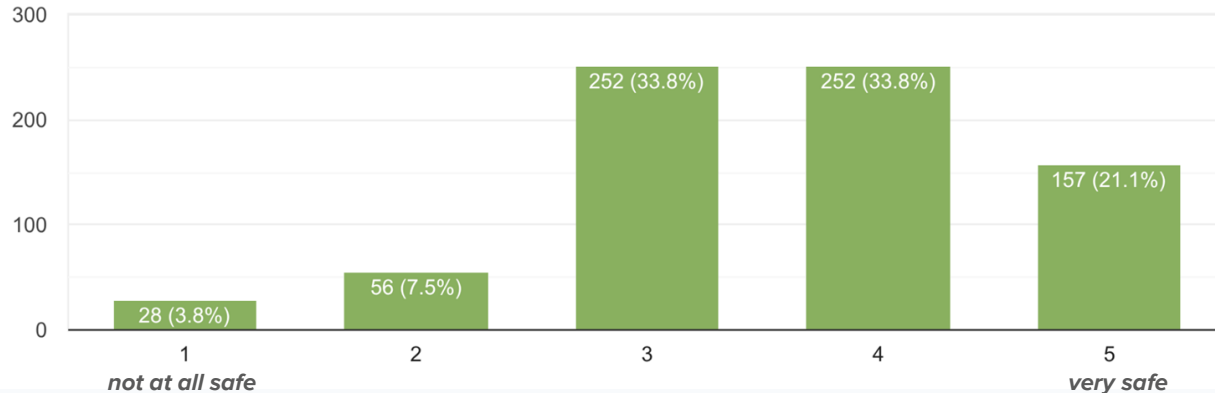
745 Student Responses from 25 middle & high schools

- **Race/Ethnicity:** Majority identify as Latinx (32.1%), Black (24.7%), and Asian (14.2%)
- **Grade Levels:** Students in grades 6-12; Slight majority of MS students
- **Genders:** Boys (46.3%) / Girls (48.7%) / Transgender or Non-Binary (3.2%) / Prefer not to say (1.7%)

WHAT WE LEARNED

only **55%** of respondents
reported feeling safe at school

WHAT WE LEARNED

Changes Students Want to See

- Know which adults to go to for help
- Improve facilities (sanitary/comfortable)
- Create an Anonymous Reporting Program

Most Frequent Conflicts Observed

- Gossip
- Verbal Arguments or Threats
- Social Media / Online issues

WHAT WE LEARNED

What could help resolve conflicts before they turn serious?

Early Intervention: Quick adult intervention and increased staff presence

Separate & Cool Down: Separate students and allow them to de-escalate before bringing students together.

Increased Communication & Use of RJ: Using RJ circles or mediation to solve for root causes.

Reach out for Adult Support: Seek help from trusted adults to help students engage in the process.

Student Accountability: Use progressive and consistent discipline strategies for all students.

Increased Student Support: Therapy, counseling, bullying prevention, and education on respectful communication and conflict mediation. Students need to learn de-escalation strategies too!
