Big Picture Learning School History



Big Picture Learning was established in 1995 with the sole mission of putting students directly at the center of their own learning. In the schools that Big Picture Learning envisioned:

- Students would be at the center their own education.
- They would spend considerable time in the community under the tutelage of mentors.
- They would not be evaluated solely on the basis of standardized tests. Instead, students would be assessed on **exhibitions and demonstrations of achievement**, **on motivation**, **and on the habits of mind**, **hand**, **and heart**
- Student work reflect the real world evaluations and preparation that all of us face in our everyday lives.











Our Vision

MetWest prepares young adults to recognize and take advantage of all resources to further their personal well-being and the well-being of their communities. Our graduates will have the skills, habits, knowledge, and networks to overcome obstacles to their success, access four-year colleges, engage in fulfilling work, and contribute positively to our world.













- Founded in 2002
- Current Pathway is Social Entrepreneurship with 256 students enrolled.
- Current Enrollment : 205 at Huerta and 51 9th graders at Huggins
- 22 students per class or less
- Advisory teacher stays with students for 3 years starting
 10th grade year.
- All students 9th-12th intern at a site twice a week
- Students who are not in internship have a Learning
 Through Interest project that they complete by the end of each semester.













- Housed at the Ericka Huggins Campus
- 51 current students
- All students are enrolled in a pathway
- Increased career exploration and internship searching skills

The Why: To help student transition from middle school to high school, receive intensive supports to get the students back on track during the pandemic, and to grow a solid core for their leap to the main campus.

- 5. Academic credit (5 credits per semester)


