Ask of the Board Discussion

Background Currently, there are few opportunities for the OUSD Board and charter schools to interact outside of Prop 39 decisions, material revisions, and renewals, the latter of which has been delayed for three years by the State legislature. In order to address this gap, the Office of Charter Schools will coordinate charter school presentations to take place at Charter Committee Meetings, per the Charter Committee Chair's request. These presentations will provide both an additional accountability touch point for charter schools as well as an opportunity for Charter Committee members to develop a deeper understanding of the charter schools authorized by the District, beginning with those up for renewal in the 2024-25 school year.
